May we suggest that you consider leaving a legacy to support the Trust in your will to provide young people with a brighter future.

Drafting a Will is not a task most people welcome, but we are advised to leave our affairs in order and to keep our Will under review. The decisions that have to be made are very personal and very difficult, but many people wish, if

they are able, to make some provision for charitable work.

The Sir Andrew Martin Trust for Young People helps the disadvantaged, assists personal effort in sports and the arts, helps young people getting started in work or a profession, those doing voluntary work overseas, or helps voluntary organisations engaged in youth work.

How you may consider supporting the Trust in your Will...

a specific gift of money for an amount that you specify. However, such a sum would devalue over the years due to inflation;

or

a Residual Legacy

a percentage shrare of your estate, calculated after debts and payments have been settled.

For when you are discussing a possible legacy to the Trust, the following clause for your Will may be helpful:

or

I bequeath to the Sir Andrew Martin Trust for Young People (Charity Number 1042358).....% of the residue of my estate.
